Take to the skies for an unforgettable flightseeing journey over the mysterious, UNESCO-listed Nazca Lines, a UNESCO World Heritage site. After a 30-minute drive to Pisco Airport, board a small aircraft specifically selected for its optimum viewing configuration. Once briefed by your seasoned pilot, buckle up for takeoff and get ready to be enthralled. Theories abound as to the origin and purpose of these enormous earthwork drawings scratched into the surface of the dry Peruvian coastal plain sometime between 500 BC and 500 AD. They can really only be seen from the air, itself a curious notion, and were only “discovered” once early Peruvian airliners began flying over the region in the 1920s. You’ll see remarkable drawings that resemble life forms such as a dog, monkey, spider, birds and a tree. And lines that show an understanding of sophisticated geometry and surveying techniques. Was this some kind of pre-Inca irrigation system? A plea from the ancients to their gods above for help with farming? The doodles of extra-terrestrials? You’ll have about 100 minutes in the air to ponder it, but don’t expect to solve this enigma.

- Soar above the marvelous, still-unexplained Nazca Lines in a limited-participation flightseeing tour.
- Travel across a canvas created at least 1,500 years ago and scattered over a 200-square-mile plateau.
- Ponder the purpose of these giant drawings of animals, humans and oddly sophisticated geometric forms cut into the stony desert floor and visible only from the sky.
- Hear what’s known – and not known – about their origin and come to your own conclusions as to their meaning.
- Wear casual, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Flat, comfortable shoes are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

PIO-001 THE PARACAS NATIONAL RESERVE

Explore one of Peru's most treasured bio-reserves, the beautiful coastal desert and mountains of Paracas National Reserve. Established back in the '70s to protect a rare and impressive ecosystem where beautiful subtropical desert fringes the Pacific and the rich marine environment created by the upwelling Humboldt Current, the reserve is a vast geo-biological wonderland. Stunning beaches – completely devoid of any green vegetation – line the coast. Arid, sculpted mountains shift their colors with the sun. And rugged sea-cliffs take on impressive forms like the famous "Cathedral," a rock arc whose walls form the preferred nesting site of raucous seabirds, and the "Monk," a brooding stone pillar parked on a small rocky outcrop at the water's edge. A wide array of marine life finds the feeding and breeding good here – including seals and sea lions, Humboldt penguins, sea otters, dolphins and porpoises. Over a hundred varieties of resident and migratory birds can be observed here, from flamingos to blue-footed boobies to the enormous Andean condor, weighing in at up to 33 pounds. Even the pre-Incas were drawn to this place; their excavated burial sites were discovered here in 1925 and can be seen at reserve's small archaeological museum.

- Travel from the pier to tour one of Peru's most scenic and vital coastal conservation areas.
- Marvel at the stark beaches, sculpted sea cliffs and multicolored desert mountains of Paracas National Reserve.
- See signature formations like the Cathedral and the Monk, and the colonies of birds who love them.
- Spot seals, otters, sea lions and penguins who frequent the rich waters along this coast.
- Wear casual, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.

Established in 1975, Paracas National Reserve features a stark yet hauntingly beautiful landscape of archaeological sites, erosion-carved cliffs, and arid desert that stretches to the sea. Pausing at viewpoints during your journey, you can expect to see everything from cacti-clad scrubland to wallowing sea lions, agile Humboldt penguins and socializing seabirds. The cast of characters changes daily, but wildlife is plentiful in this long-protected refuge fed by the nutrient-rich sea waters of the Humboldt Current. After a time, you'll step out onto a trail leading to a sheltered bay, where you may spot throngs of scarlet and white flamingos. Down on the beach, follow your instructor through a series of poses as you enjoy a delightful yoga class – made all the more relaxing by the soundtrack of wild nature and the caress of gentle sea breezes. Be sure to look beyond the surf for the bottlenose dolphin and otters that love this place, too.

- Take in the remarkable biodiversity of Paracas National Reserve, where a stunning coastal desert collides with the sea.
- Learn about the flora and fauna that thrive here as you pause at viewpoints during your coach journey.
- See dramatic color-shifting desert cliffs, cacti and bulrush, abundant birds – possibly even basking sea lions and penguins jumping along the rocks.
- Walk a trail down to a sheltered bay and enjoy a guided yoga session on the beach.
- Keep an eye out here for crimson flamingos, or dolphins and otters enjoying the surf.

During your journey, you'll marvel at the famous Candelabro de Paracas, an enormous three-pronged earthwork etched into the hillside in the style of the Nazca Lines. Together with the cluster of offshore Ballestas Islands, this terrain comprises the most ecologically significant coastal wildlife sanctuary in Peru. You won't disembark as you cruise around these protected islands, but your vessel will approach closely enough to observe some of the seabirds and marine mammals who live and breed there. Be on the lookout for Guanay cormorants, Peruvian boobies and pelicans, and Chilean flamingos. Agile Humboldt penguins and large colonies of lazy sea lions also congregate along these rocky shores. And don't be fooled by the barren-seeming landscape; nutrient-rich upwelling waters from the Humboldt Current make this an extremely abundant fishing ground for animals – and seafood restaurants.

- Cruise out for an inspection tour of the most important wildlife sanctuary on Peru's coast.
- Skim the shores of Paracas Peninsula and nearby Ballestas Islands, two parts of a rugged desert reserve blessed by food-rich Pacific waters.
- Observe the abundant bird and marine life that thrives here – everything from condors and cormorants to penguins, sea lions, turtles and dolphins.
- View the famous "Candelabra" – a giant line drawing etched into the sandy slope of Paracas Peninsula without clear meaning or explanation.

Travel into the arid Andean foothills to view earth-art left behind by ancient cultures and taste modern wines made from grapes that thrive in this unique climate. The Pan-American Highway traces the coast southward from Coquimbo, past beautiful beaches at La Herradura, Las Tacas and Guanaqueros. In time, you'll turn inland and enter 'Enchantment Valley' along a country road. Here you'll find yourself in an open-air museum of scientific and cultural importance, inhabited as far back as 4,000 years ago by the El Molle culture and other hunter communities. You'll visit a spot where curious petroglyphs of masks, heads with antennae, tiaras, sun symbols and animal shapes appear deeply engraved into the rock surfaces, and small cup-like depressions known as piedras tacitas are carved into the stone. Returning to the current era and the 'Road of Grapes,' you'll head to Tabalí Vineyard for a tour and tasting. Offerings include some eight different wines, each with its own distinctive character but all with one characteristic in common – that their grapes were grown in a very moderate climate where high and low temperatures vary little and rainfall is scanty. You'll sample the delicious results, along with some light snack accompaniments.

- Enjoy a scenic drive down the Chilean coast and inland through an arid pre-Andean landscape.
- View fascinating petroglyphs etched in the stone thousands of years ago by indigenous hunters.
- Tour the fields and cellars of Tabalí Vineyard, then sample their distinctive range of Reserve and Special Reserve wines.
- Learn how grapes thrive in this unique climate with little temperature variation and even less rain.
- Wear layered, weather-appropriate clothing.
- Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.

Spend a day immersed in natural beauty and stunning architecture on a tour of capital city Santiago and the heritage beach resort of Cartagena. It's a scenic two-hour drive inland from the port at San Antonio across the central valley and through the coastal mountains to Santiago. Once there, your panoramic city drive covers many of the top historical and modern highlights of Santiago, including stately La Moneda, the Presidential Palace. A drive up to the top of Cerro de la Cruz provides a thrilling birds-eye vantage point on both what Punta Arenas looks like today and some of what Ferdinand Magellan might have seen when he dropped by in 1520. The beautiful Brunswick Peninsula and Sarmiento Mountain are over one shoulder, while over the other and across the Strait is the large triangular island the explorer named Tierra del Fuego or Land of Fire. The residents of Sea Lion Island are heftier; dozens of its namesake mammals cluster on the rocks, the men typically twice the size of the ladies and weighing up to 800 pounds. Perched on its own mid-channel rock, Les Eclaireurs Lighthouse is another photo-worthy site. But the most captivating of all is Martillo Island's colony of Magellanic penguins. These highly social birds will often come right up to the cat as they prowl the channel waters for cuttlefish and squid.

- Board a catamaran and sail the picturesque waterway at the End of the World, Beagle Channel.
- Pass by pristine island habitats where seabirds, sea lions and Magellanic penguins flourish.

All told, you'll have about an hour to revel in this extraordinary wild environment before the return to Stanley.

- Be greeted by an unforgettable array of wildlife – breeding colonies of Gentoo and King penguins, nesting Ruddy-headed geese and skuas, even occasional dolphins and sea lions.
- Watch the entertaining animal show from the beach or from a table at the cozy Sea Cabbage Café.
- Drop into the Bluff Cove Museum to gain insights on the area's natural history and farming activities.
- Spend an hour experiencing this remarkable setting at your own pace before the trip back to Stanley.
- Wear warm, waterproof clothing.
- Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.

Board your comfortable sightseeing vessel for this six-mile journey out past the wide mouth of the Rio de la Plata, and be on the lookout for a low-slung green rock anchored by a crisp white lighthouse. As you get closer, the Isla de Lobos reveals itself to be alive with thousands of South American sea lions – frolicking in the water, feeding on fish, air-drying on rocky outcrops, and noisily interacting with each other. They live for about 20 years in the wild and the males are easily told apart from the females thanks to being triple their size. Once overhunted and in decline, these rotund creatures are now well protected, and their colony is thriving. Towering above the shoals here, their lighthouse is Uruguay's tallest – a replacement for the original light that early hunters had razed to make seal catching easier.

- Cruise out to a remote offshore islet that thousands of plump, highly-social sea lions call home.
- Learn the history of this now-protected marine population's rise, fall, and resurgence in recent years.
- Spend about 45 minutes circling Sea Wolves Island, watching the blubbery goings-on.
- Gaze up at Uruguay's tallest lighthouse and maybe even spot one of the whales known to frequent these waters.

One sight you won't have to search hard for is the city's signature lighthouse, soaring some 150 feet above the Punta Salina peninsula since 1860 and built with volcanic ash from Italy and glass from France. Adjacent to Lighthouse Square sits the handsome sky-blue Candelaria Church, and not far away are a pair of beaches known for their pounding surf. At a point where the scenic coast is wildest, you'll encounter Punta's most renowned beach attraction of all – "The Hand," an iconic concrete sculpture of a giant hand with just its fingertips emerging from the sand. The artist is Chilean, and the scale of this thing is ... impressive. As the ride continues, you'll encounter ample evidence for why Punta del Este is considered one of South America's most glamorous resort cities. In fact, the elegant, exclusive Beverly Hills and San Rafael neighborhoods might have you contemplating a Uruguayan getaway home.

- Spend about three hours on two wheels, guided through the cycle-friendly streets of Punta del Este.
- Explore a peninsula surrounded by the calm Rio de la Plata and the wilder Atlantic shoreline.
- See key Punta del Este sights like the lighthouse and Candelaria Church and spin through several tony residential districts.
- Capture a photo standing in front of one of the enormous fingertips of The Hand, an iconic sculpture buried on Playa Brava beach.
- Wear weather-appropriate clothing.
